Connecticut's Commission on Fiscal Stability and Economic Growth



During the bipartisan budget negotiations this past fall, members from the business community offered their expertise to help solve Connecticut's long term fiscal problems. We crafted a provision creating the Commission on Fiscal Stability and Economic Growth, which met through the winter and provided a comprehensive report on March 1.

The Commission's recently released report found that Connecticut's real gross state product remains 8% below 2007 levels and lags neighboring states and national averages. Almost all New England states have recovered from the 2008 recession, except Connecticut. According to the report, General Fund expenditure growth is projected to increase by 3.7% while revenue is only projected to increase by .7%; therefore, budgeted fixed costs will steadily grow to reach 53.1% by 2020. As of June, 2016, our total debt liabilities, including borrowing and unfunded pensions and health care exceeded \$85.6 billion. Annual contributions to keep the Teacher's Retirement Fund afloat, using a realistic discount rate of 5.5%, will reach \$4 billion by 2023 trending upward to \$8.4 billion by 2032. While 26.5% of our revenue goes toward paying this obligation, the highest in the country, Connecticut will need to spend 35% of its annual tax revenue just to cover this debt over time.

It goes without saying that Connecticut's taxes are higher than the United States average. Beginning in 2009 through 2015, Democrats led the charge with significant tax increases on corporations, high income earners and the middle class attempting to raise more revenue. Since 2011, Connecticut has seen an out-migration of wealth totaling over \$6 billion dollars through 2016. Despite these loses, they approved a state union contract that provide some short-term savings, but long-term expenses, including pension increases, raises, bonuses and job security for the next four years. That agreement failed to acknowledge or consider the needs of Connecticut residents.

Over the last ten years, Democrats have accused Republicans of routing for failure, being negative and anti-union. I have written many articles regarding our fiscal health which advocated reductions in borrowing and spending. Sadly, as the Commission conducted its work, members said that they didn't

According to research conducted by The Hartford Insurance Group, it seems like most baby boomers would rather go to the dentist for a root canal than talk to their aging parents about estate planning. The research indicated about 71% of parents of baby boomers were comfortable discussing estate planning with their children, whereas only 54% of their children were comfortable having such discussions. Talking about your parents dying is not a fun topic to explore. Although it may be a hard conversation to have, it can make such a difference after your parents are gone. This is too important of a conversation not to have.


Getting the conversation started is the hardest part. A few simple guidelines can help turn this conversation into a positive experience. The most important rule is to include ALL of your siblings in the conversation. Nothing works quicker to undermine your intentions than excluding someone. Group discussion fosters a free exchange of ideas. Choose a comfortable and private setting for this family meeting that is free from distractions.

The family is assembled, in a comfortable, private, space...then what? How do you actually start the conversation? A good way to start is to discuss your own plan. Discuss with your parents what your estate planning experience was like. Talk about what your estate plan contemplates. Another way to start the conversation is with an article or book on estate planning. If your parents are readers this is a terrific place to start.

What Has Changed

The Florida shooting: an estranged young man shoots up a school... again. Why does this happen more often and how can we prevent it? First, examine the difference between our pacific past and the new age of dismemberment and discord.

Were legal firearms more or less accessible in the past? More than fifty percent of households lawfully possessed firearms in the 1970s. By 2014 that figure dropped to less than a third. (Trends in Gun Ownership in the US, Tom W. Smith & Jaesok Son). This decrease in access to legal firearms shows – if anything - that access to firearms is inversely proportional to the increase in mass shootings. There must be another reason for the increase in mass shootings. What has changed?

Is it inept law enforcement? Reports show that our FBI had no fewer than four chances to stop the Florida shooting. See something say something didn't work. The best and brightest seem inept. Will someone explain this?

Some blame the increasing incidence of mental disorders. The potential reasons for this are frightening: dangerous substances in our food, water and atmosphere; violent video games; EMF from cell phones and computers; vaccines; and Hollywood's desensitization of murder, sexual proclivity and deviancy.

To those inclined to solve this by somehow banning guns, the quintessential question: How can laws keep guns from those who intend to break the law? The Florida shooter, after all, intended to beak the law, whether with an AR-15, a semi automatic pistol, a pipe bomb or a 3000-pound car. How would banning firearms prevent fast and furious gun running across our borders? With illegal firearms at a premium – like liquor during prohibition - riches to be won by any given crime syndicate salivating over our unenforced borders. Rethink the wall?

Can we curb our desire to defend ourselves? Or should we diminish the deviant's desire to do evil? As to the first question, I find it frightening to think that the government wants to render us docile and powerless in the face of those who would do us harm. As to the second, your guess is as good as mine. But to lump the innocent with the evil by blaming the implement is a fool's errand, like blaming the car for the drunk driver's manslaughter.

Jerome Harrison School Hosts Head Shaving Event





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2018-2019 North Branford Public Schools' PreSchool Applications Being Accepted

The North Branford School District was awarded a Smart Start Grant prior to the start of the 2017-2018 school year to establish a pre-kindergarten program for approximately 15 of the district's youngest learners. The district is using that grant award to fund a Smart Start Preschool Program classroom at Jerome Harrison Elementary School.

The mission of the preschool program is to provide experiences that will promote social, emotional, physical, language, and cognitive learning and development through a differentiated and integrated program. Superintendent Scott Schoonmaker describes the Smart Start Program as an entry point to North Branford's coherent PreK-12 continuum- a continuous, sequential, progressive, aligned set of learning experiences designed to provide students with the foundational knowledge and skills that are ultimately necessary to be prepared for college and career and be a responsible 21st Century citizen of the world.

Children residing in North Branford born after January 1, 2014 and before January 2, 2015 are eligible to apply. This program meets 5 days a week at Jerome Harrison Elementary School (JHS) following the North Branford Public Schools' Calendar (181 Days) and JHS school-day (9:00am -3:25pm). The program is provided by the school district at no cost to parents.

Applications will be reviewed and considered according to Smart Start requirements:

Children in the following circumstances will be high priority for enrollment: poverty (children who are from families with incomes at or below 75% of SMI or receive free or reduced lunch), homeless, migrant, refugee, violence and neglect (DCF involved, in foster care), developmental delays, and/or challenging parental circumstances (teenage, incarcerated, in treatment for substance abuse, active military service).


After priority students are offered a required percentage of enrollment, any available enrollment will be determined and offered based on an application lottery system.

Students at Totoket Valley Elementary School were greeted on Friday, Read Across America Day, as they entered school by 44 North Branford High School students who lined the halls to motivate continued reading. These high school students, known as the Dream Team, are a group of mentors who work with the TVES during the school year. They support classrooms with small group instruction, character education lessons, whole school events, and generally motivating and inspir-



ing our elementary students. At Read Across America Day, in partnership with high school teacher and Dream Team leader Mrs. Nicole Lacroix, these students took the lead after welcoming students.

The day opened with a whole school assembly/reading rally in the morning where Dream Teamers led students in a pledge to commit to reading. They also showed a video they created at their high school that introduced the "One School, One Book" campaign and inspired reading. This video introduced the book our students and staff will be reading and discussing in the coming weeks, "Fish in a Tree" by Connecticut author Lynda Mullaly Hunt. The assembly went on, under the direction of the Dream Team, to include poems and student presentations from TVES classes. The assembly concluded with another video detailing an original song created and produced by the Dream Team around the book "Fish in a Tree" and the themes of diversity, accepting differences, and overcoming adversity. Students and staff were impressed by the work of the Dream Team in leading the assembly.

The second part of the day included all 44 Dream Team students partnering with their TVES classes to teach a lesson about "Fish in a Tree", diversity, accepting differences, and overcoming adversity. These lessons were interactive, student-led and designed to get students excited about their whole school book. The "One School, One Book" idea developed by library teacher Ms. Carrie Seiden will mean that all students and classes and all adults (teachers and support staff) will read the book and share ideas and reflections during the coming weeks at school. Dream Team students will also be reading the book so they can share in the learning.

Finally, Read Across America Day at TVES ended with a whole school quiet sustained reading for 30 minutes. Students lined the halls and got comfortable with their books as did all staff members. It was a thing of beauty to see the whole school engaged with a book of their choice for 30 minutes, and it was a great way to honor Read Across America Day.

Principal Welch offered some words about the day at TVES. "I am simply blown away with the amount of time and preparation that went into today by Mrs. Lacroix and each high school student. Their commitment to our school continues to impress me, their service to their NB community is amazing, and their poise, leadership, and professionalism is second to none. Mrs. Lacroix and these students made the day here at TVES." Welch continued, "that the day was about learning and community and is a special event due to the connection among our students and the opportunity to have our high school students teach and mentor our elementary students." I am truly honored to be part of the learning, passion, and district collaboration by so many and our students are so lucky to be influenced by a community focused on care and learning."

North Branford Hosts a Naturalization Ceremony Written by Mrs. Thompson's Grade 4 Class at TVES

Students of North Branford Public Schools had the opportunity of a lifetime on February 6, 2018 to attend a Naturalization Ceremony at the North Branford auditorium. This live court-session ceremony was made possible by TVES/NBIS parent Monica Watson-Cucchiarelli and TVES principal Carter Welch. Approximately 500 students in grades 4, 5, 8, 10, and 12 from the North Branford Schools had the privilege of attending.


The U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS), which is reaching out to public schools, sponsored the ceremony for 30 immigrants who came from 18 different countries on five different continents. "Immigration is a giant thing because you walk into the Naturalization Ceremony and you are about to become a new citizen," said Gavin Leone, a fourth grade student from Totoket Valley Elementary School.

Judge Joan G. Margolis, United States Magistrate Judge for the District of Connecticut, presided over the ceremony which opened with patriotic songs from the North Branford High School Jazz Band. The North Branford Cub and Boy Scouts then carried the flags as the audience stood for the Pledge of Allegiance. The featured speakers were principal of Totoket Valley Elementary, Carter Welch, Superintendent of North Branford Schools, Mr. Scott Schoonmaker, and Superintendent of Branford Schools, Hamlet Hernandez. They talked about the educational value of the ceremony for students and famous immigrants who have made an impact on our country and world, and Mr. Hernandez who came from an immigrant family himself, spoke of the courage and bravery it takes to make a life in a new country.

One immigrant from Peru had trouble learning English, but she had to learn quickly to translate for her sister who was only five at the time. "And it didn't help that I was really shy," she reported. She was here for 19 years before becoming naturalized. Another Cape Verde immigrant got sick because of the colder climate here in Connecticut. Through the process students even discovered that their own bus driver was a naturalized immigrant from Russia.

The highlights of the ceremony included the Calling of Countries, the Oath of Allegiance, and the Awarding of Certificates. It ended with a reception in the auditorium for the 30 new citizens of the United States of America and their families. From that day forward, these immigrants will have the right to be free, to vote, to get a U.S. passport and enjoy all the other civil rights as Americans. As you may be aware, each month Totoket Valley Elementary School holds climate and community building assemblies to bring all students and staff together. These assemblies highlight student awards/recognitions, class presentations, and include all students, many family members and community members. Additionally, each month the assembly has a focus around a social-emotional or character trait that we as a school are working towards for that month. For the month of February our school focus was perseverance. Principal Welch wanted to make this assembly stand out given all their efforts with the "Growth Mindset" and he wanted to help students understand and internalize this trait in an authentic way. Welch

remembered the story of Adam Greenberg and Greenberg's recent book "Get Up". Through a mutual friend in coaching circles, Welch was able to secure Adam as a speaker for the February assembly at TVES.

The assembly started, as it always does, by inspirational words from TVES teacher David Lacroix, this time about perseverance and effort. Next, two TVES fifth grade students introduced featured speaker Adam Greenberg. Adam shared his story of hard work, dedication, set backs, fighting adversity, and true perseverance as detailed in his book. He included the effort and hard work it took to make the MLB and debut with the Chicago Cubs, and how on his very first major league at bat and in the very first pitch he ever faced, it all changed as Adam was hit with the pitch and suffered a devastating head injury. He went on to talk about all the setbacks and hard work he faced to battle back again and again to reach his goal of being in Major League Baseball. During his presentation Adam showed video clips from the events along the way, including his injury and the "One More At Bat" campaign that led to his return to MLB as a Miami Marlins player for one more at bat.

Students were mesmerized and engaged by the dynamic and entertaining presentation from Adam, and they got to spend time learning more about Adam through a question and answer session at the end of the assembly. In one of his final answers Adam reminded all students to not waste time playing video games, but to get out and experience life, be active, and be social with friends and your communities. At the end of the assembly, over 150 students got to meet with Adam in the library and talk more with him as Adam individually signed their copies of "Get Up".

TVES students, family members, and staff thoroughly enjoyed Adam's time at TVES and they were all moved by his presentation and story. There is no doubt we all learned more about perseverance and how to use it our own lives to reach our goals. TVES sincerely thanks Adam for what he brought to each of us.



Ask the Forester Quiz Program - Date Change


